GEF helps kids, families through pandemic

I he pandemic created some unusual challenges for Groton educators and students, but the Groton Education Foundation was there to help.

The GEF made more than \$23,000 in grants during the past two years to support initiatives ranging from outdoor classrooms to distance learning and even access to healthy food that was reduced when schools closed.

The GEF gave Children First Groton \$3,000 in seed money for a program that provided 450 meals weekly to Groton kids and their families.

"The children were at home," learning remotely, said Susan Corrice of Children First Groton. "You can't do that on an empty stomach."

Corrice said some people were in tears, they were so grateful for the help at a time when access to food was difficult. The program also provided hygiene products, masks and even books for children to read.
